A new year a time for reflection and good cheer – here at International House of Rhode Island we feel confident that our work is meaningful and important and that the chance to build good community through friendship and understanding will never fail us. We are attracting lots of international visitors and in 2016 we welcomed over 6,000 participants to our programs, and volunteers logged in 1,800 hours of service (we rely on our wonderful volunteers to assist us in carrying out our particularly important mission to "promote friendship, connection, learning and global understanding by bringing people together from around the world for cross-cultural exchange"). Thanks to our members and friends for supporting our efforts and keeping the notion of building a community of international friends alive!

At a recent Board retreat we discussed how difficult it was to put our finger on describing exactly what the work that we do here really is. We're not just a community center, not just a social gathering place with ethnic dinners and potluck luncheons, not just a safe haven for lively conversation and connection, but we ARE all these things and also we exist to welcome differences and find similarities. We provide a passport for understanding cultural connections where we can all travel without airfare – creating a village of world citizens – just the ticket in the pursuit of world harmony.

The Fundraising Committee was working in overdrive this year - our needs have increased due to code updates that are needed for the building's fire alarm/safety system - this group, chaired by Kate Richardson and including Julia Ma, Paul Mooney, Charley Otto, Ruth Otto, Barbara Seidenath, Bill Shuey, and John Walker, created the SAVE OUR BUILDING event on November 10, 2016 - we raised \$14,000 (!!!) through this effort and all funds donated will be used solely for the purpose of costs associated with preserving our outstanding 1899 building designed by prominent Rhode Island architect Edward Nickerson.
